Unit of Inquiry:

In this inquiry, the students inquired about building and structures, the types of buildings and their importance. They also inquired about the materials used to construct a building. Students understood the different types of materials used for different types of houses. They discussed the natural and manmade materials that are used to build a house.

Students also inquired about the second line of inquiry "how the buildings impact on the environment" where they discussed the importance of constructions and as well as the adverse effects of constructing buildings as trees are being cut down.

The geckos went to Taramati Baradari for a field trip to understand the indigenous architecture. They explored and observed the structure, designs of the monuments to understand how the structure was formed.

Transdisciplinary Math:

Going with our first line of inquiry on our current unit "Buildings" and "the considerations taken into account while building a structure", the students came up with the topic money and measurements during the brain storming session. This led to the discussion on different denominations used in our country, different currencies, how money is used to buy almost all the things, how to count the money, how to get the change, and the value of money. Students loved the learning engagement wherein they enacted as buyer and seller with the fake money. They were very excited to know how to get a change of the given denomination with fake money where in number bonds were revisited. Moving further they practiced word problems on the money. In measurements, we revisited length, and weight was introduced to them. They understood that standard units of measurements are important to take any measurements and nonstandard units of measurements are mere approximations. As we know revisiting deepens understanding while reinforcing knowledge students did 3-digit additions and subtractions as a part of it.



Transdisciplinary Language:

"Learning gives creativity, creativity leads to thinking, thinking provides knowledge and knowledge makes you great."

- Mr. Abdul Kalam

As rightly said by Mr. Kalam learning makes you great. Our geckos show a great interest in acquiring knowledge. They deeply inquire into whatever the topic is being discussed. As per the discussion on our central idea, structure of a sentence was discussed with them. They came to know that there are 4 different types of structures in a sentence. They inquired only about simple sentence and compound sentence in which the geckos learnt how to create them by joining two or more independent clauses together. In a learning engagement they were given different words in the form of flash cards and they had to form sentences with the same. They came to know that for a proper sentence, punctuations are a must to be considered, like beginning with a capital letter, ending with a full stop, and so on. In course of framing sentences, they were asked to identify the parts of speech like noun, pronoun, verb, and adjective. Moving further in the compound sentences, conjunctions were introduced. Students understood that conjunctions of cause highlight a cause-effect relationship between two ideas or give a reason why something happens or is the case.



2nd Language:

Hindi: Students learned how three and four- lettered words are read through simple sentences without 'matras'. They practiced writing the sentences. This helped them understand sentence-structure which will later help them to avoid spelling errors and grammatical errors. To make learning fun, students were shown pictures which were identified by them. They recognized the pictures and wrote their names below it. Through this learning engagement, learners develop their thinking skills. Students were orally introduced to kriya(verb), they learned this topic through learning engagement in which they were told to act a form of verb like clapping hands, running, playing etc. they learned about verb.

Telegu:

In the first week of this month, the letter ya and Bandi ra were introduced. Characters were practiced by writing on the blackboard and writing in notebooks. In the second week, a-eluka, A-Anugu, I-ice cream were introduced, and writing was practiced through the worksheet. Listening to the story based on the worksheet, recognition of the Ai vowels in the story was conducted. They were also practiced o O ou letters.

French:

Students have started the month of February by learning the indefinite articles in French. They can use appropriate indefinite articles for the classroom objects. They were taught expressions like c'est and ce sont. Now students can present an object or a person by using these expressions and construct small sentences with indefinite articles.



Music: Students learnt songs

- Our National Anthem
- Saare Jahaan se achha.

Dance: This month the children learnt the steps of free style dance. We performed on a variety of dance videos and showed to the children for them to understand the steps of that freestyle. Along with that we discussed the importance of dance.

We also completed the clapping dance activity. This activity was useful for developing interaction skills among the children. As a part of this activity, the free style dance was invoked here.

Drama: The students worked on the following areas for the month of February:

- Exploring the physical skills and challenges: awareness, control, expression, trust.
- The senses as a fertilizer for the imagination, infused in all aspects of Drama

Art: The geckos had a discussion on drawing. Later they learnt simple concepts of drawing. They created artworks and learnt to paint using watercolours. They also learnt different techniques of pencil shading.

PE: The geckos are learning throwing skills while using the different sized balls or with various balls. They are practicing the underarm throw, over-hand throw and side throw. They are also learning the catching skill and its follow through.



Field Trip:

A field trip is one of the best ways to provide the real-world experience to the students which contributes to their understanding of the learning and the world in a broader context. Therefore our enthusiastic geckos went on a field trip to Taramati Baradari on 18 February 2020 in connection with our fifth unit of inquiry under the theme "How the World Works".

Our students went with the objective to identify and observe the different types of structures as a part of their inquiry where they are dealing with structures and buildings.

Taramati Baradari, situated on the banks of Musi river, is a fascinating piece of architectural art and a vintage treasure. As our third line of inquiry deals with indigenous architecture, visiting Taramati Baradari was a best way to introduce the students with various indigenous architectures, as this structure is a symbol of indigenous Parisian architecture. Our students were amazed by the elegance of the structure and got an idea on how structures can differ and there can be various types of structures of buildings apart from the apartments.

The fun-filled field trip to Taramati Baradari helped the geckos to make a connection between the class discussions on different types of buildings and structures and real-life structures.



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


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

Month Ahead

Unit of inquiry:

Geckos will be inquiring into the next line of inquiry: Indigenous architecture and how buildings are impacting the environment. They will also share their understanding about the inquiry.

After that geckos will be inquiring into the 'signs and symbols'.

New Inquiry:

- Theme: How we organise ourselves.
- Central idea: Signs and symbols are part of humanmade systems that facilitate local and global communication.
- Lines of inquiry
 - Signs and symbols similarities-differences.
 - Ways visual language facilitates communication.
 - Specialized systems of communication.
- Key Concepts: Function, Connection, Perspective.
 - Related concepts: Culture, Media, Pattern, Access.



Month Ahead

Transdisciplinary Language:

Geckos will learn about adverb and will revisit the grammatical concepts and picture composition. We will also deal with reading comprehension.

Transdisciplinary Math:

Moving further the geckos will be learning repeated additions, skip counting and will revisit the previously covered concepts like operations, +, -, and patterns.

2nd Language:

Hindi: Geckos will learn how words join to make sentences. They will practice this by making their own sentences through simple words. They will also learn the names of fruits orally.

Telugu – They are going to learn recognition and reading varnamala in order.

French - They will be learning être verb and they will be able to construct simple sentences employing être verb to tell the time.



Month Ahead

Dance:

Next month we would like to introduce a new dance activity and the geckos will also learn freestyle dance.

Music:

Students will be learning the following songs:

- Grandfather's clock
- Voh raatka tara.
- Small world.

Drama:

The geckos will be working on the following areas in the month of March:

- Begin to understand appropriate behavior in drama. For example, as an audience and as a performer.
- Work independently with self confidence.
- Explore the movement and the use of space.

Art:

The geckos will have assessments.

PE:

The geckos will practice the catching skill in sequence, such as eyes on a ball line, make a cup shape with hands and follow throw. They will also learn striking the equipment and its uses in various games and related games.
