Mindfulness and well-being

Students and teachers practiced mindfulness every day, focusing on experiencing and engaging with their surroundings through guided breathing. Learners also practiced mindfulness activities like Self-Awareness, Mindful Walking, and Hissing Breathing. As part of well-being, learners actively participated in group discussions. This was followed by the sharing of their reflections.



Core Values:

The core value of the month "Respect," was taught in various ways. The children read stories and discussed what respect looks like in the classroom, at home, while playing in the park, and in the environment. They also shared real-life examples of how they showed respect to one another.

Learning to learn week:

We were thrilled to welcome our students to a new and exciting academic year! We began with a special "Learning to Learn" week, where our PP1 students were introduced to the essentials of learning and growing together in a supportive and engaging environment. Throughout the Learning to Learn week, students were engaged in several fun activities like stories, picture talks, read-aloud story sessions, and fun games, which helped them get comfortable in the class and share their thoughts, views, and hobbies.

Unit of Inquiry:

The students began their journey towards the first unit of inquiry about senses under the transdisciplinary theme "Who We Are." To ignite curiosity and set the stage for our first Unit of Inquiry, "Our Senses," we organized a provocation task with five interactive sensory stations. Each station was dedicated to one of the five senses: sight, smell, taste, touch, and hearing.

Throughout the month, our young explorers engaged in various activities, stories, and discussions designed to help them understand how their senses work and how they use them to explore the world around them.







Language:

The facilitator engaged the students in various planned learning engagements which helped in assessing the students' prior knowledge. Students completed the entry-level assessments for phonic sounds. They shared details of their favorite colors, toys, and cartoon characters. They were introduced to uppercase and lowercase letters 'Ss', 'Aa', and 'Tt'. The interactive jolly phonic rhymes and games were enjoyed by the students. They learnt the phonic sound

Drama:

Students worked on the following areas demonstrating the attribute of a communicator for June and July.

Identifying the expressions.

Listening to a story and imitating the characters.the jolly phonic jingle song. They practiced writing these letters in their notebooks and participated in creative activities such as letter-matching games and sound recognition exercises. The hands-on approach not only reinforced their understanding of the letters but also helped them connect phonics to their everyday experiences, making learning both engaging and meaningful.

Math:

The students were engaged in a variety of interactive math activities to assess their prior knowledge. Students participated in entry-level assessments for number recognition and shapes, sharing their favorite numbers and shapes with their peers. They were introduced to the numbers from 1 to 10 in sequence, with the concept of zero being introduced separately before moving to the number 10. Through engaging songs, hands-on games, and fun visual aids, students practiced counting objects, identifying numbers with quantification, and understanding the role of zero. They were also introduced to basic strokes such as standing lines, sleeping lines, right curves, and left curves. Students enjoyed air tracing, tracing numbers in sand, using the green board, and writing numbers in their notebooks, thereby enhancing their understanding of these essential math concepts.







PE:

Students developed various styles of walking, jogging, running, and different types of jumping and exercises. These activities were thoughtfully designed to enhance physical fitness and coordination. Our students took on fun and challenging activities such as zig-zag running, shuttle runs with a ball, hopping exercises, dragging a ball with a hula hoop, and balancing activities. Through these engaging exercises, our students learned new skills while fostering a sense of accomplishment and confidence

Art:

Students engaged in various techniques of art. They filled pictures using dot painting, sponge dabbing, and vegetables. They observed different artworks and shared their understanding of what they saw, thought, and wondered. Their prior knowledge was assessed, and they chose an art form to create their artwork. Students used printing techniques and created impressions using different objects to observe the effects. Students observed and created artworks using bottle caps and shared their observations. They used their imagination to create pictures using bottle caps and different objects available around them.

Dance:

Students learn to be aware of and perform in at least three contemporary acting techniques. They are introduced to basic techniques and engage in body isolation exercises through warm-ups, stretching, and fundamental dance movements. This practice helps them execute a wide range of movements, including both locomotor and non-locomotor actions, in choreography. Key activities include bounce leg movements and body hops, which contribute to their overall performance skills and movement coordination.

Music:

Students are learning how to produce sound using small percussion musical instruments. They are also being made aware of how to create rhythm through body percussion music, using their body parts like clapping, feet tapping etc. Additionally, students are being taught voice modulation notes. They have been introduced to the school song, the national anthem, and the patriotic song "Love My Country."

Unit of Inquiry:

In the upcoming month, students will explore the second line of inquiry: "How we use our senses to connect to the world around us." They will investigate how each of their senses helps them understand and interact with their environment. Through engaging activities and hands-on experiences, students will deepen their understanding of sensory perceptions and their role in connecting them with the world.







Learning and Teaching - Month Ahead

Language:

Students will be introduced to uppercase and lowercase letters and their phonic sounds through various learning engagements. They will practice letter formation through interactive learning engagements. They will also enhance their vocabulary by learning new words and their meaning during the inquiry.

ART:

Students will continue to explore printing techniques and their importance. They will also continue with different types of art involving tearing and pasting.

Math:

Students will explore the concept of before and after, reinforce their understanding of numbers from 1-10, and explore the place value concept. They will have a recap of numbers 11-20, focusing on quantification, sequencing, and understanding their place value. Students will also learn about the shape rectangle through engaging activities that enhance shape recognition and understanding.







Learning and Teaching - Month Ahead

Drama:

Students will work on the following areas demonstrating the attributes of a communicator/ inquirer for August.

- Prediction of a story
- Exploring the sounds of animals along with expressions

PE:

Students will focus on throwing and catching, outdoor games, and coordinating activities. These activities are designed to promote teamwork, communication, and sportsmanship while encouraging a healthy and active lifestyle.

Dance:

Students will develop improvisation skills for creating movement and discovering new possibilities within their dance style. They will explore a high range of movements, including body vibrations and hops, to enhance their dance expressions and versatility.

Music:

Students will learn body percussion musical rhythms and how to accompany songs with percussion music. They will also learn patriotic songs, the National anthem, and the school song. They will be made aware of the various families of instruments, including string instruments, wind instruments, percussion instruments, and melody instruments.
